
Ionization energy losses

Fast charged particles moving through matter interact with the electrons of atoms in the material. The interaction excites or ionizes the atoms. This leads to an energy loss of the traveling particle. The Bethe-Bloch formula describes the energy loss per distance travelled of charged particles (protons, alpha particles, atomic ions,...) traversing matter. The non-relativistic version was found by Hans Bethe in 1930; the relativistic version (shown below) was found by him in 1932.

$$-\frac{dE}{dx} = \frac{4\pi}{m_e c^2} \cdot \frac{nz^2}{\beta^2} \cdot \left(\frac{e^2}{4\pi\varepsilon_0}\right)^2 \cdot \left[\ln\left(\frac{2m_e c^2 \beta^2}{I \cdot (1-\beta^2)}\right) - \beta^2\right]$$

The Bethe formula is only valid for energies high enough so that the charged atomic particle (the ion) does not carry any atomic electrons with it. At smaller energies, when the ion carries electrons, this reduces its charge effectively, and the stopping power is thus reduced. But even if the atom is fully ionized, corrections are necessary. Bethe found his formula using

quantum mechanical perturbation theory. Hence, his result proportional to the square of the charge Z of the particle. The description can be improved by considering corrections which correspond to higher powers of Z. These are: the Barkas-Anderseneffect (proportional to Z^3 , after Walter H. Barkas and Hans Henrik Andersen), and the Blochcorrection (proportional to Z^4). In addition, one has to take into account that the atomic electrons of the material traversed are not stationary ("shell correction"). The introduction the Bloch of correction may be another reason for the common name Bethe-Bloch formula. But logically, one would then have to speak of the Bethe-Barkas-Andersen-Bloch formula, and nobody does that...



Goal of these exercises

The aim of these exercises is to plot the energy losses for (simulated) protons crossing the silicon detectors of the PAMELA apparatus.

<u>Basic informations</u>: you will work on a set of events coming out from a PAMELA experiment simulation. The given file

/home/mocchiut/pamela/data/pamsimu2013.root

contains the TTree pamcalotree, storing data with the PamCalo class, header file:

/home/mocchiut/pamela/PamCalo/inc/PamCalo.h

so library:

/home/mocchiut/pamela/PamCalo/lib/Linux/libPamCalo.so.

The ROOT file contains a mixture of different particles: protons, antiprotons, electrons and positrons in an energy range from about 1 to about 20 GeV.

In these exercises, we will create a variable to select protons from the sample (qt=qtrack/qtot) and we will save this and other variables on a different file for positive particles. Then we will use a script to select protons and to plot their energy losses versus energy. Finally, we will fit the profile distribution using two different functions and we will compare the chi2 of the fit to determine which one is representing better the point distribution.

Exercise 1

Write an an executable compiled program which reads the input file

/home/mocchiut/pamela/data/pamsimu2013.root

and gives as output a new ROOT file containing a TTree with four variables (a TBranch for each one):

- dEdx
- energy
- qt (≡qtrack/qtot)

Save into the new file events which satisfy the following condition:

1. each event has energy greater than zero.

Hints:

- to compile, remember to add also the compilation flags:
- -I/home/mocchiut/pamela/PamCalo/inc
- -L/home/mocchiut/pamela/PamCalo/lib/Linux/
- -lPamCalo
 - to run, remember to export LD_LIBRARY_PATH:

export LD_LIBRARY_PATH=/home/mocchiut/pamela/PamCalo/lib/Linux/:\$LD_LIBRARY_PATH

Exercise 2

Write a ROOT-CINT <u>script</u> which reads the output file of exercise 2 (should be similar to this one: /home/mocchiut/scripts/EM_output_160714.root use this file if you are not able to complete or run exercise 1) and gives as output on the screen <u>and</u> on the disk (pdf format) a TCanvas divided into two pads (one column, two rows — hint: TCanvas::Divide) which contain from top:

- 1. a scatter plot (TH2D, use nbins=1000 for both axis) of dEdx vs energy (with colors and palette) for events with qt>0.9 (this condition selects protons from the sample);
- 2. the same scatter plot with overlying the profile as function of X (TProfile, TH2D::ProfileX()).

Set the range properly in order to look close to the event distribution.

Try to answer the following questions:

- 1. Is the profile over the peak of the distribution (try to use interactively TH2D::SetShowProjectionY)?
- 2. Are the distributions in projected slices used for the profile calculation symmetric?

Exercise 3

Update the script of exercise 2 in order to draw a new TCanvas divided into three pads (one columns, three rows — hint: TCanvas::Divide) which contain from top to bottom:

- the profile of dEdx vs energy for events with qt>0.9 fitted with the function f(x)=a+b/x (hint: fit range [1.5,18.]). The resulting fit line must appear (in red) over the distribution and the resulting chi2 must be printed by the script on the STDOUT.
- The profile of dEdx vs energy for events with qt>0.9 fitted with the function $f(x)=a+[(b+x^2)/x^2]$ (hint: fit range [1.5,18.]). The resulting fit line must appear (in green) over the distribution and the resulting chi2 must be printed by the script on the STDOUT.
- The dEdx vs energy scatter plot (with colors and palette) for events with qt>0.9. Draw also, in the energy range from 1 to 20 and on the same plot, the line corresponding to the function for which the fit gave the smallest chi2 (hint: inside the script compare the two chi2 and perform the choice with an if statement).

Save the output on the disk as pdf file.

Answer the following question:

1. What happens if the fit range is extended up to 20 GeV? Why? What can be done to fit up to 20 GeV (hint: read the TH1 reference page)?

- create a directory and put inside this directory ALL the files you want me to correct and look at.
